The Easter Bunny vs. The Risen Christ.

I have been seeing lots of fun Easter Egg hunts and the Easter Bunny popping up in all sorts of secular events, from business to community events. I don't mind so much. If the world wants to have a secular holiday and enjoy hunting for eggs and a fun-loving giant bunny as the mascot, fine. It just makes it necessary to communicate what Easter means to us clearly.

Before we can communicate Easter's importance and essence, we must first lay a little groundwork. The worldly view of being human, the existence of God, the Son of God, and the Holy Spirit. You cannot fully appreciate Easter without claiming our truth as Christians.

In the worldly view, a person's existence is a happy accident resulting from millions of years of evolution. Cells just happened to stumble into the right formation to take the next step in evolution. There is a religious version of evolution that acknowledges the power of God, calling all living things to the smallest molecule to become their highest possible expression of themselves. This study of God's work is called Process Theology. In the worldly view, we are born and live with no thanks to God, and when we die, we become dirt. No life after death, no spirit, no soul. In this worldview, why not turn the Easter Bunny into a mascot and a prop for promoting your business or organization without mentioning Christ or God?

Contrast that with a person of Faith's view of being human. Our physical body are the living temple of the spirit God breathed into us. Each birth is a series of millions of miracles, God's influence calling every cell and molecule to form a child. This life force is the divine power calling all things into being. We believe we have a spirit, a life force that comes from God and will someday return to God. We also call this spirit a soul. The soul indicates a certain wisdom, a knowledge of the divine reality that goes beyond our ability mentally to capture it fully. The more we practice living in faith, the more we see God working in and through our lives. Our life journey, in short, starts and ends with our God, and our walk is fulfilling as we experience the joy of God's presence in our lives.

The worldly view of God is that there is no God, and if there is, it is irrelevant to our lives because bad things happen to good people and God does not stop it. God does not exist, or if he does, he is a cruel God that does not care.

We of Faith believe God deeply cares and, more importantly, is with us in our suffering. We also believe God has the power to heal, and we believe and see miracles happen. That is not to say we are untouched by life losses. We see all of life's blessings and pains in their entirety. We don't presume to understand why God chooses to act or not. God is beyond our understanding but not our ability to worship, praise, and experience God's grace, peace, and Love.

In the worldly view, Jesus is a great man, a teacher, and perhaps even a prophet. We of faith see Jesus as alive, healing, feeding, and renewing our faith. Jesus was the human manifestation of God for us to experience living in the truth and presence of God. Jesus suffered every kind of pain, from betrayal to being crucified. His resurrection from death to life is not in our past but present and future. Jesus' grace turned even the theft on the cross next to him into a testimony to the love of God that never stops giving us a choice to be with him. Jesus took our brokenness, our sin, and our pain to the tomb. In his resurrection, he brought us out of that tomb to join him in the present and someday in heaven.

In the worldly view, there is no seeking the Holy Spirit. To us, the Holy Spirit is the presence of Christ, our Lord, in our lives. The spirit is how we encounter Christ in our daily lives. We center ourselves in Christ's peace.

Let us be clear about what we stand for as Christians! We live and serve the risen Savior with great joy, and when our race is won, we will unite with Christ in Heaven!

The day started bright and early, with UCC volunteers assembling sandwiches and loading up 5 vehicles with food, crafts, and gifts. After a beautiful drive through several small farming communities in Southern Illinois, we arrived at The Chapel on the Hoyleton residential campus.

We were met there by Christy and Ashley, as well as other members of Hoyleton staff, who helped us prepare for the residents that would be arriving from six various cottages, including kids who travelled all the way from Lehre Haus in Belleville, IL.

Due to the age differences of the cottage residents, we arranged activities by cottage. We had an Easter egg hunt, complimented with an Easter bunny (Cody) and a bubble machine. Inside we had stations set up for face painting, crafts, book giveaways and gift baskets. Some walked over to Koelling field to play a competitive game of kickball. By the end of the day, the smiles on the faces of the residents, and their telling us of how much fun they had, made the long day more than worth it!

St. John UCC of Maeystown has been supporting the mission of Hoyleton Youth & Family Services for about 100 years. The church has been providing this Easter celebration to the residents for about 10 years, with a pause during Covid. This is our second year since the pandemic.

Notes from Church Council

Student Pastor

- Pastor reviewed a proposal to make Tim Burns a Student Pastor at St. John and Zion UCC. Pastor reviewed the student pastor responsibilities. Tim is currently in an online pastoral certificate program and active in the church ministry.
- The annual cost of the student pastor position is estimated at \$11,700 annually with St. John responsible for 2/3 of the cost and Zion responsible for 1/3. St. John has \$5,000 in the 2024 budget funded by donor to support the Student Pastor position.
- A motion was made by Fay Ross to approve the proposal to add Tim Burns as a Student Pastor and seconded by Mark Rey. All in favor. Motion carried.
- The council will hold an information meeting after church on April 28th to discuss the Student Pastor proposal. The congregational ballot vote to approve the Student Pastor will occur on May 19th.
- More information regarding the Student Pastor responsibilities is included below.

Student Pastor

Description and responsibilities for the proposed St. John and Zion UCC Student Pastor position

- **Primary responsibilities:** Learn and grow in their gifts for ministry.
- Secondary responsibilities: Provide added support to the many missions, ministries, and programs of the church, congregation, and community.

Participation in Ministry

- **Preaching:** Leading the Sunday worship service at least once every 6 weeks, as well as filling in for Pastor Poole when absent.
- Senior Programs and Ministries: Aiding with the existing programs as well as helping to develop new ministries.
- **Music Ministry:** Special music for Sunday Worship service as needed, sharing personal songs and their context with the Youth Group, as well as the seasonal outdoor performances held prior to the Sunday worship service outside the Church Hall.
- Wednesday Warmup Program: Continuing the existing Wednesday warmup program, as well as exploring other possible social media ministries.
- Youth Ministries: Providing devotional messages at youth group meetings, as well as added support for the After School Program and all other youth events and ministry efforts.

Education

• Currently enrolled since August of 2023 in an online Pastoral Certificate Program provided through Phillips Theological Seminary Center for Ministry and Lay Training.

UCC Illinois South Conference

• As of February 2024, approved and accepted into the Conference as a Member in Discernment (Student-In-Care) pursuing licensed ministry.

Hours and Income

- Hours and income will be divided between St. John (2/3) and Zion (1/3) churches
- 15 hours a week at \$15 an hour, totaling \$11,700 yearly
- St. John responsible for \$7,800 (2/3) **\$5,000 currently in the budget for seminary student
- Zion responsible for \$3,900 (1/3)

Quilt raffle will replace regular raffle held that night. Sue will provide a drum for the tickets. The drawing will take place at 7pm. An additional person may be needed to help with selling the tickets that evening. Cathy has volunteered to take the quilt to Floraville UCC February 11th to sell tickets.

After school workers were discussed. Faye will send out a text message for volunteers. It was decided that unless the volunteer is new we would only have one other worker since it has been difficult to get two volunteers per event.

Barb and Faye will bring desserts for the March meeting on the 7th.

March 3rd is Women's Sunday. Cathy and Nancy will be greeters. Pat, Barb and Marietta will take offering. Sue will read scriptures. Faye will read call to Worship/Invocation.

Hoyleton Honors night February 23 was discussed. Tickets are on sale with deadline of February 12th. St John's UCC Maeystown and Zion UCC St. Joe will be among the honorees that evening.

Laurie Brown has donated pie wedges for the Octoberfest Pie stand.

End of the year supplies reimbursement was discussed. The Fastnacht supplies are always donated so in the future and bill associated with the Fastnacht will not be included.

No birthdays celebrated. Nancy V and Barb made a motion to adjourn, motion carried. We closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Cemetery Board

The Cemetery Board met on March 5, 2024, at 7:00 PM. Present for the meeting were Allyn Rohlfing, Lenny Schwarze, Ross Mueller, Sheryl Prange and Pastor Poole; Aaron Voelker was unable to attend.

The meeting was called to order by President Allyn Rohlfing, and Pastor opened the meeting with a prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were presented. The treasurer's report showed the following balances: General Fund-\$25,036.10; Savings Account-\$18,436.13; and Asphalt Fund-\$2,717.34. A motion was made by Lenny Schwarze, seconded by Ross Mueller to approve the reports as presented. Motion carried.

The Board budgeted the following expenses for 2024: \$10,000 for mowing and trimming; \$5,500 for tar and chip for the lower driveway; and \$4,000 to seal the asphalt (upper) driveway. Thanks to generous donations received, the Board feels that they will be able to complete projects that were postponed earlier due to lack of funds.

A motion was made by Lenny Schwarze, seconded by Ross Mueller to invest \$10,000 in General Funds for one year to increase income. Motion carried.

Old Business:

The street address sign as required by Monroe County 9-1-1 is ready to be installed. The light on the flagpole is being replaced by Charlie Hoerr.

The John Deere tractor is to be sold. Lenny Schwarze is interested in purchasing it, and a fair sales price will be determined.

New Business:

Routine maintenance: The dead tree has been removed from the outer edge of the cemetery along LL Road. The tree will be replaced this fall. The tree near the toilet building has been trimmed to prevent dead branches falling onto stones. Grass has been seeded, as needed.

The Board will review Illinois state law regarding the burial of cremains (ashes).

Cost of opening graves for cremation was discussed. It was decided that the price for Member/Spouse opening in the cemetery will be \$450; for a non-member the cost will remain at \$600.

There being no further business, a motion to adjourn was made by Ross Mueller, seconded by Lenny Schwarze. Meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

At Emmaus Homes they journey along the road of life with their clients, supporting them as they worship, work, sleep and eat. Pastor Andrea also talked about some of her experiences at Eden Seminary and her journey that led her into ministry. Thank you, Pastor Andrea, for coming to our meeting.

Minutes of the meeting of November 15 were approved as presented on a motion by Hayden, seconded by Emma. Motion carried.

The checking account balance is \$4,935.85. A motion to approve the Treasurer's report was made by Hayden, seconded by Emma. Motion carried.

Old Business: T shirts were discussed. David Henerfauth has prepared the design, and the suggested shirt style is short sleeved crew neck in sapphire blue. A motion was made by Payton, seconded by Claire to approve the design, style and color. Motion carried.

New Business: Pastor encouraged the members to try to volunteer for a shift helping at Fastnacht.

Pastor presented information regarding the Hoyleton Honors banquet on February 23. Both Maeystown and St. Joe congregations, along with the youth, will be honored at the banquet. (The YPL donated \$500 to Hoyleton to purchase Christmas gifts, and also planned, sponsored and attended an Easter party at Hoyleton for their youth in 2023.) A motion was made by Emma, seconded by Henry to purchase a table for eight at the banquet for \$600. Motion carried.

This year's Easter party at Hoyleton will be March 23, if that date works with Hoyleton's schedule.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer. The evening ended with a Roll the Dice Valentine gift exchange followed by refreshments. Thank you, Tricia, for the Rice Krispie treats!
